DEEPENING OUR ROOTS: AN EXCITING ANNOUNCEMENT

FROM FARM MANAGER, LEO GORMAN

Grow Dat is expanding! After two successful seasons of cultivating 50 young leaders and growing 16,000 pounds of vegetables, we are very excited to announce the expansion of our farm site from 4.2 to 7.2 acres! In close collaboration with our core partners, Tulane University (led by Tulane City Center) and City Park, over the next two years we will increase field production space from 1.5 to 3 acres. This agricultural expansion will position Grow Dat to grow more food, earn more income and hire more young people for our fall internship and spring youth leadership development program. This fall we'll begin the

expansion process by tilling to create new fields on what used to be golf course pre-Katrina. Next, we'll plant the fields with cover crops - plants that help to suppress weeds, fix nitrogen, aerate the soil, add organic material and reduce erosion. Cover crops are perhaps the most important organic farming technique we utilize to grow food sustainably. By spring 2014, Grow Dat Crew Members will be harvesting our signature market crops of kale, chard, collards, radishes, tomatoes, basil, lettuce, arugula and our bestselling Grow Dat Salad Mix for sale and donation. We will plant 30 additional fruit trees, including satsuma, blood orange, Meyer lemon, kumquat and fig.

FALL ON THE FARM

The Farm Team has been busy building up soil fertility in our new fields and preparing all of our growing spaces for fall/winter planting. After letting the soil rest for several months this summer, we have slowly been incorporating cover crops such as sun hemp and cow peas into the fields. Greenhouse propagation began in September, sprouting kale, broccoli, lettuces and many herbs for both our own fields and to sell at our annual Plant Sale. Early October has brought temperatures in the mid-70s to low 80s and many breezy afternoons. It's been perfect weather for youth interns and staff who are working outside in our makeshift potting shed, 'bumping up' starter plants the Plant Sale ('bumping up' translation: transplanting young plants into larger pots as they grow).

How The Expansion Helps Us Grow

IN 2014 WE WILL:

- Grow a total of 10,000 lbs of food; 2,000 lbs will be grown on our expanded 1.5 acres
- Donate a total of 4,000 lbs of food; an additional 900 lbs of produce will be donated to our Shared Harvest partners because of our larger fields
- Sell a total of \$30,000 worth of produce; \$7,000 of sales will come from produce that was harvested in new fields
- Have a total of 7 acres of farmland and Eco Campus; the expansion provides us with 1.5 acres of fertile, well-drained arable soil
- Push crew members in the spring leadership program to grow through increased responsibility for more land and growing space
- "Farmscape" throughout new growing areas to increase presence of beneficiary insects and pest predators

YOUTH RECRUITMENT IS IN FULL SWING

We have expanded to a sixth partner school: Lusher Charter School! This fall we will hire 40 young people to join our 2014 Leadership Program. Our Program Team is currently leading pitches at our high schools to get students interested in applying for a job with us. If you know a teenager who

INTRODUCING OUR FALL 2013 YOUTH INTERNS

In September we launched an expanded Fall Intern Program. We offered seven part-time employment opportunities to Grow Dat graduates in three different areas of specialization: Agriculture, Administration, and Education & Outreach. Internships are dual-purpose: they create more leadership opportunities and responsibility for youth, and they further Grow Dat's mission as Interns work as 'junior staff' on our team. Interns work an average of eleven hours per week and are engage in a range of tasks.

Agricultural Interns learn advanced skills in sustainable agriculture, both conceptual and hands-on. In addition to cultivating plants for our fields and annual Plant Sale, they give farm tours, and run workshops both on and off-site.

Administrative Interns work with staff in the office on a variety of tasks including: managing our Facebook and Twitter accounts, printing and mailing donor thank you letters, filing, assisting with special events, and preparing educational materials.

Education and Outreach Interns are piloting our

community education program which will continue to unfold over the next several years. These Interns currently lead a series of off-site workshops in the areas of Wellness (cooking and nutrition demos) and Sustainable Agriculture (composting, vermiculture, and raised beds demos). This fall they will lead cooking demonstrations at the New Orleans Botanical Garden, run Wellness tours with clients from the local Brinton Family Health and Healing Center, and are featured as weekly guest educators at the afternoon education program run by the Backyard Gardener's Network in the Lower 9th Ward.

LAUNCHING OUR SATURDAY FARM STAND

Join us every Saturday from 9am-Noon to purchase youth-grown produce in the City Park area's only weekend produce market.

Stock up on your weekly supply of fresh sustainably grown veggies, herbs and cut flowers direct from our farm in City Park! Our specialties include salad mix, arugula, lettuce, kale, chard, and a variety of herbs. Produce is grown and sold by our youth employees. Fall Interns will be leading free tours of our fields, eco-campus and bayou corridor.
